

## Winnipeg Harvest opens new training facility

Winnipeg Harvest opened a new training facility Wed-nesday that the organization says will help their clients learn the skills needed for

them to find meaningful

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Harvest's executive director David Northcott explained the facility — called the Asper Learning & Friendship Village because the Asper Foundation covered the \$100,000 in start-up costs — will expand the training for at-risk youth, immigrants, at-risk youth, immigrants, refugees, food bank clients, and low-income families and

The newly-renovated
room offers clients computers with internet access, and
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money was also used to pay for training modules, and new trainers for the variety of courses offered at Harvest.

"This centre ... is going to provide, not just a place to come, not just a place to be, this is a proactive learning centre," explained Asper Foundation chair David Asper

On top of providing Winnipeg Harvest with the capital to open the new facility, the Asper Centre has also pledged an additional \$25,000 a year for the next three years to cover operating costs. ing costs.
