

Restoration

Boker Tov Adon Fidelman

In Tel Aviv's old industrial district. master carpenter and restoration artist Yakov Fidelman's world shifts with the arrival at his aging shop of Anton, an eccentric young drifter and day laborer in search of a job. For a meagre salary and lunch, Anton becomes the aging Fidelman's apprentice. This carefully crafted film traces the shifting bonds between Yaakov; his son Noah; and Anton, the secretive new assistant. Yaakov and Anton restore a 100 year-old Steinway, while creating a fatherson dynamic that tests the relationship between Yaakov and Noah. Gradually Fidelman comes to understand that his only hope for redemption and happiness is to learn how to let go of the past, acknowledge his weaknesses and accept the inevitable dictates of time. *Restoration* is a powerful film about intergenerational conflict and loyalty.

Footnote

Hearat Shulayim

Footnote is the tale of a great rivalry between a father and son. Fliezer and Uriel Shkolnik are both eccentric professors, who have dedicated their lives to their work in Talmudic Studies (the body of Jewish and ceremonial law). The father, Eliezer, is a stubborn purist who fears the establishment and has never been recognized for his work. In contrast, Uriel is an up-and-coming star in the field, who appears to feed on accolades, endlessly seeking recognition. Then one day, the tables turn. When Eliezer learns that he is to be awarded the Israel Prize, the most valuable honour for scholarship in the country, his vanity and desperate need for validation are exposed. His son Uriel. meanwhile, is thrilled to see his father's achievements finally recognized but, in a darkly funny twist, is forced to choose between the advancement of his own career and his father's. Will he sabotage his father's glory? Footnote is the story of insane academic competition, the dichotomy between admiration and envy for a role model, and the very complicated relationship between a father and son. This high-grossing film in the US has been nominated for, Best Foreign-Language Film, Academy Awards in 2012.

In Heaven Underground

Im Himmel, unter der Erde - Der jüdische Friedhof Weißensee

This enchanting documentary is a journey into history that celebrates life and the immortality of memories. North of Berlin's noisy city centre, surrounded by a jungle of trees and lush foliage, lies the peaceful and secluded 130 year-old Weissensee Jewish Cemetery, the largest Jewish cemetery still in use in Europe. Its one hundred acres holds 115.000 graves and a meticulous archive record. The cemetery has never closed, and was one of the few institutions to remain in Jewish hands during the Nazi regime. Awardwinning director Britta Wauer's charming portrait creates a serene experience following a delightful array of characters from around the world: mourners, tourists, a young family residing at the cemetery, a third-generation gravedigger and an ornithologist studying rare birds of prey.

My Lovely Sister is a modern Moroccan-Jewish legend. It is a love triangle between the primitively superstitious Rahma, her rude husband Robert, and the ghost of Rahma's beautiful sister Marie who died from the pain of banishment. Over the years Rahma had insisted on disowning her younger, beautiful sister Marie because of the latter's marriage to an Arab fisherman and because Rahma suspected that Marie was involved with Robert. Rahma, who is superstitious and converses with one of the walls in her home as though it were a living being, refuses to forgive her sister despite Marie's repeated pleas to return to the bosom of the family. For his part, Robert, who has been in love with Marie for years, has difficulty ignoring his passion for her and devoting himself to his own family. Rahma and Robert will go through an emotional and passionate journey with the ghost of Marie so that they can fall in love and accept one another. This surreal legend takes place in an impoverished housing block in one of Israel's peripheral towns.

Eichmann's End: Love, Betrayal, Death

Eichmanns Ende

Two years after the end of the war, Adolf Eichmann lived, undetected and under a false name, as a chicken farmer in northern Germany. But in 1950 he disappeared. **Eichmann's** End: Love, Betrayal, Death reveals the incredible true story of the love affair between Eichmann's son and the daughter of Lothar Hermann, a Holocaust survivor who immigrated with his family to Argentina after the war. The love affair led to Eichmann's eventual capture by the Mossad when Hermann recognized Eichmann and verified his identity for the Israeli secret agents. The film is based on interviews conducted with Adolf Eichmann by the Dutch former SS officer turned journalist Willem Sassen in Buenos Aires in 1957. These protocols offer a chilling glimpse into the psyche of a mass murderer. This feature film incorporates interviews with key figures in the affair including Sassen's daughter and the Mossad head of the operation, Rafi Eitan, with high end dramatization of the events.

In Darkness

From acclaimed director Agnieszka Holland, gripping feature In Darkness is based on a true story. Leopold Socha, a sewer worker and petty thief in Lvov, a Nazi occupied city in Poland, one day encounters a group of Jews trying to escape the liquidation of the ghetto. He hides them for money in the labyrinth of the town's sewers beneath the bustling activity of the city above. What starts out as a straightforward and cynical business arrangement turns into something very unexpected, the unlikely alliance between Socha and the Jews as the enterprise seeps deeper into Socha's conscience. The film is also an extraordinary story of survival as these men, women and children all try to outwit certain death during 14 months of everincreasing and intense danger.





Nicky's Family

Nicky's Family is a documentary that tells the nearly forgotten story of Nicholas Winton, an Englishman who organized the rescue of 669 Czech and Slovak children just before the outbreak of World War II. Winton, now 102 years old, did not speak about these events with anyone for more than half a century. His exploits would have probably been forgotten if his wife, 50 years later, hadn't found a suitcase in the attic, full of documents and transport plans. Winton's story is a very emotional one, and thousands of children in many countries have decided to follow in his footsteps and do something important. They think up various charity projects and even help in the saving of lives of undernourished and sick children in Cambodia and Africa. Dozens of Winton's "children" have been found and to this day his family has grown to almost 6,000 people, many of whom have gone on to achieve great things themselves. The unique phenomenon that has emerged from Winton's story, how his courageous acts many years ago continue to influence people from all over the world and motivate them to do good.

Poland, mid '60s. A fragmented family in a poor neighbourhood. The mother, who is separated from her Polish husband, spends most of her time working to provide the basic needs for her two sons. who are 10 and 14 years old. Left to their own devices, the boys join a neighbourhood gang with a strong Neo-Nazi orientation. One day the gang enters a Jewish neighbourhood, beating and stabbing some youngsters, and are arrested by the police. The mother succeeds in convincing the police to release her sons, but is shocked to learn about their involvement with Neo-Nazis. She had always thought that she was protecting her sons by concealing her past and origins, but now she must tell them the truth, she is a Jew. A Holocaust survivor, she wanted to raise her sons as Catholic, but she realizes that they cannot continue to live like this and decides to leave Poland. She takes the older boy into her confidence, but the younger son is told that they are immigrating to Australia, while the truth is that they are boarding a ship to Israel. The film explores the struggle to form an identity in a new country, while trying to build a new life in a foreign country.

The Flat

Ha-dira

The Flat is one of the most captivating and noteworthy documentary films to be made in Israel in the last few years. The flat on the third floor of a Bauhaus building in Tel Aviv was where director Arnon Goldfinger's grandparents lived since they immigrated to Palestine in the 1930s. Were it not for the view from the windows, one might have thought that the flat was in Berlin. When Goldfinger's grandmother passed away at the age of 98, the family was called to the flat to clear out what was left. Objects, pictures, letters and documents awaited the relatives revealing traces of a troubled and unknown past. The film, which begins with the emptying out of a flat, develops into a riveting adventure, involving unexpected national interests, a friendship that crosses enemy lines, and deeply repressed family emotions. It even reveals some secrets that should have probably remained untold. In this important and fascinating film, a small flat turns into a story about a national and private gripping history.

Inspired by true events, *Remembrance* is a remarkable love story set against the backdrop of the darkest of times. At a German concentration camp in Poland in 1944, romance blossoms between a young Jewish woman, Hannah (Alice Dwyer) and Polish political prisoner Tomasz (Mateusz Dami´cki). They steal passionate moments together and fuelled by love, they manage a daring escape. But during the chaos and confusion of the last moments of war, they lose all trace of one another. More than 30 years later, happily married New Yorker Hannah (Dagmar Manzel) sees a familiar face on TV. Could it really be Tomasz, the man she loved and lost all those years ago? Aided by an impressive cast, beautiful cinematography and an intelligent script, the assured hand of Anna Justice (Max Minsky and Me) shows enough restraint to create accomplished cinema that explores the deepest emotions without resorting to cliché or sentimentality.
