Feature | Israel | 2024 | Director: Shemi Zarhin | Hebrew, Arabic w/Eng subtitles | 125 minutes

A married couple must confront painful truths in this graceful, insightful drama from director Shemi Zarhin (Bonjour Monsieur Shlomi). Effie and Sassi are a Mizrachi couple living in Israel's Upper Galilee, still in love after years together. Effie, in her early 50s, works as a physical therapist and music teacher by day. Her husband, Sassi, 20 years her senior, also works multiple part time jobs. The two make bourekas at night to sell to a local restaurant. The couple never stop working and both look exhausted. The question is "Why?" Starring legendary Israeli actors Sasson Gabbai (Shtisel, The Band's Visit) and Asi Levy (Aviva My Love), Bliss is a beautiful exploration of expressions of love, the strong bonds of family, and Israel's rich cultural diversity.

Historical drama | Germany | 2024 **Directors: Judith Kaufmann and Georg Maas** German w/Eng subtitles | 98 minutes

In the last year of his life, ailing author Franz Kafka finds love, and, at long last, happiness with political activist Dora Diamant who works at the Jewish People's Home. Pitch perfect performances by Sabin Tambrea and Henriette Confurius as Kafka and Dora and beautiful costumes and sets that capture the Weimar Germany period round out this engrossing testimony to the power of love at any time in a person's life.

## Saturday, May 24 8:00 p.m.



Comedy | USA | 2024 | Director: Daniel Robbins | English | 84 minutes

Kyra Sedgwick leads an ensemble cast in this hilarious film about a Shabbat dinner gone wrong. Very wrong. David (Jon Bass) brings his fiance, Meg, (Meghan Leathers), who's in the throes of converting to Judaism, to his parents' Richard (David Paymer) and Ellen's (Sedgwick), Upper West Side home for Friday night dinner. Meg's Catholic parents from Wisconsin are coming, too, to meet his family. Things derail faster than you can say "hamotzi" when an accidental death (or is it...murder?) occurs. Fast paced, full of clever dialogue and smart snappy writing, this film promises non-stop entertainment.


## Sunday, May 25 2:00 p.m.



Narrative based on a true story | Israel | 2024 Directors: Adir Miller, Doron Paz, Yoav Paz Hebrew and Hungarian w/Eng subtitles 120 minutes

Adir Miller is one of Israel's best known standups, but in this film he delivers a quietly powerful dramatic performance based on his own life story. Arnon Noble is a religious man with a strong bond to his mother Violetta (Tiki Dayan; Seven Blessings), a Holocaust survivor from Hungary who speaks at schools about how her life was saved thanks to a thin gold ring. When Violetta's health deteriorates, Arnon and his estranged daughter (Joy Rieger; *Past Life, The Other Story*) travel to her hometown to search for the ring that saved her life. The movie nicely captures the atmosphere of Budapest, but it's the relationships among the three leads that we remember most. Some solid funny one liners from Miller and an exploration of the experiences of second-generation Holocaust survivors round out this excellent, multi-layered film.

### Sunday, May 25 7:00 p.m.



Documentary | USA | 2025 | Director: Nimrod Shapira | English | 75 minutes

Torn delves into the controversy surrounding the KIDNAPPED poster campaign, which turned first NYC streets, then streets all over the world, into unexpected battlegrounds for pro-Israel and pro-Palestine activists. What started as a seemingly simple grassroots effort to raise awareness about the 251 hostages held by Hamas, quickly escalated into an emotionally charged paper war, mirroring the complexities of the conflict overseas. Torn explores war, freedom of speech, art, activism, and public expression. The film acts as both a mirror and a catalyst reflecting societal divisions while fostering empathy, introspection, and transformative conversations.



Drama | Canada/France | 2025 | Director: Ken Scott | French w/Eng subtitles | 102 min.

Quebec filmmaker Ken Scott's drama/ biopic is about a mother's fierce love and determination to help her physically disabled son. Set in nostalgia-tinged 1960s Paris, the first half of the film follows Esther, mother to a large family including her youngest son Roland, who is born with a club foot. Ignoring all doctors' advice, Esther vows that Roland will walk, enjoy a happy, normal childhood and have a future. As the decades pass, the film becomes less about disability and more about passion, self-discovery, and the lingering influence of a mother's love. Viewers may find similarities between My Mom, God, and Sylvie Vartan and the French mega- hit, The Untouchables. This is a film with heart with an outstanding performance by Leïla Bekhti as Esther.

Historical drama | Finland | 2024 | Director: Klaus Häro | Finnish w/Eng subtitles 85 minutes

Director Klaus Häro uses his talent for adroit, factually based films to bring us the lesser known story of Jewish refugees in Finland during WWII. Like a Finnish Oskar Schindler, the Finnish-Jewish businessman, Abraham Stiller (Ville Virtanen), risks everything to protect the refugees and the rest of Finland's small Jewish community, as Nazi influence grows in Europe. A handsomely appointed and nuanced recreation of a true story and the story of Jews in war-time Finland, which, owing to various geopolitical factors, greatly differed from others in Europe.


Documentary | Israel/USA | 2024 | Director: Yael Melamede | Eng and Hebrew w/Eng subtitles | 81 minutes

Ada Karmi-Melamede is one of the most accomplished women architects in the world. (Her body of work includes the Supreme Court Building in Jerusalem.) But little is known about her outside her home country of Israel. ADA - My Mother the Architect is a deeply moving portrait of an extraordinary woman directed by her daughter, filmmaker and former architect, Yael Melamede, and includes raw and moving dialogue between the mother and daughter and an exploration of the realities of career vs motherhood.

Historical Drama | Poland | 2024 | Director: Marek Bukowski | Polish w/Eng subtitles 59 minutes

Set in 1929 Warsaw, this stylish period drama tells the story of the pre-war Polish national chess team, the sport's once and forever "Golden Team." The Polish chess players stood at the forefront of the game worldwide for over a decade, but, as the Nazis begin their occupation of Poland, the fate of the team— many of whom are Jewish, including the charismatic Dawid Przepiórka and legendary Akiva Rubinstein-stands at the edge of the abyss.






Comedy/Drama | France | 2024 | Director: Noé Debré | French w/ Eng subtitles 90 minutes

A French comedy-drama about the last two Jews living in a largely immigrant Paris suburb. Michael Zindel plays Ruben Bellisha, a likeable, if aimless 27-year-old. The veteran French actress Agnès Jaoui is his ailing, housebound mother, Giselle. Unable to cope with the change of their surroundings Giselle wants her and her son to move out. But Ruben, a nice Jewish boy, beloved by the community, can't imagine any upheaval, whether changing neighbourhoods or figuring out his life. A fair bit of subterfuge ensues. A Nice Jewish Boy straddles comedic satire and drama, while addressing difficult realities about Jewish life in France. Bellisha's performance, at times using improvised dialogue, is career-making.

Comedy | Argentina | 2024 | Director: Oliver Kolker | Spanish w/Eng subtitles 106 minutes

Moti Cohen, a once-prominent Buenos Aires rock producer now in decline, seizes a chance for a comeback. Fueled partly by the need to pay for his son's Bar Mitzvah, Moti scouts for the star of a 'New Talent Contest' focusing on Tango. Fate leads him to a stuttering mechanic whom he plans to turn into Argentina's next Tango star. The director, Oliver Kolker, is a well known tango dancer who gives us insight into the world of Tango along with a warm and engaging film.


Feature | Israel, Poland | 2025 | Director: Dana Modan | English, Hebrew, and Polish w/Eng subtitles | 108 minutes

Beloved Israeli actress Rivka Michaeli stars as Regina who, with her granddaughter Mika, embarks on a journey to Poland to reclaim family property seized during World War II. Their quest quickly unravels as Regina unexpectedly decides to abandon the mission entirely. To complicate matters an annoying distant relative shows up around every corner. Just as Mika finds herself falling for a charming tour guide, Regina seizes the opportunity to pursue her own hidden agenda. Based on the graphic novel by Rutu Modan.

Documentary | USA | 2025 | Director: James L. Freedman | English | 93 minutes

The eternally sardonic, brilliant actor-comedian Charles Grodin's life and career is given the spotlight in this rich and multifaceted portrait. A master of dry wit and deadpan delivery, Grodin captivated audiences with beloved performances in The Heartbreak Kid, Midnight Run, and countless sharp-witted late-night TV appearances. In his later years, Grodin turned to advocate for justice and pressing social issues, using his platform as CNBC talk show host. Filled with great footage and A-list commentary, this film is an eminently watchable, fully rounded portrait of a unique performer and person.

#### Saturday, May 31 8:00 pm



Feature | Israel | 2024 | Director: Lior Chefetz Hebrew w/Eng subtitles | 113 minutes

Starring Michael Aloni (Shtisel; When Heroes Fly). The Stronghold is based on a true story of an IDF outpost that suffered heavy losses during the Yom Kippur War, and which became the scene of one of Israel's most traumatic battles. Dr. Nahum Werbin (Aloni) arrives at the remote Sinai outpost wearing white sneakers and a pukka shell necklace, expecting nothing more taxing than handing out aspirin and blister cream. The outpost is commanded by Shlomo (Daniel Gad), an Orthodox soldier, who is expecting that Yom Kippur deep in the Sinai will be marked only by prayers and fasting. But when the unit soon finds itself outmanned and outgunned, moral and tactical questions arise. The film focuses on the human cost of the war and the collapse of leadership - in a painful mirroring of current challenging times.

On a chilly, early spring evening in the winding streets of Tel Aviv's arty Neve Tzedek neighbourhood. Peter and Lili, two golden agers, meet up after much pressure from Nelli, a 31-year-old architect who is Lily's daughter and Peter's friend. The two walk and talk about heartbreak, missed opportunities, and their experiences as single parents, leading to the film's climax when Lily reveals a secret she's been keeping for decades. Tommy Lang's minimalist style, and cinema verité approach results in a powerful, touching, and highly watchable film.

Fictional documentary based on archival footage | Netherlands | 2025 | Director: Sandra Beerends | Dutch w Eng subtitles 85 minutes

Neshoma

A groundbreaking film at the intersection of fiction and history. Neshoma is set in Amsterdam between World Wars I and II, when one out of ten of the city's residents was Jewish. Pasting together real archival material and using historic testimonies from the Jewish community before World War II, the film invents a story of a 17-year old girl. Rusha lives in the Jewish Quarter, and writes letters about her life, friends, family and community to her older brother, Max, who has emigrated to the Dutch East Indies, now Indonesia. Astonishing and inventive, the film brings to life a nearly vanguished community of proud diamond cutters, haggling traders at the flea market, cabaret artists, city officials, social activists and entrepreneurs.




Narrative | Israel | 2024 | Director: Nir Bergman | Hebrew w/Eng subtitles 106 minutes

In an ultra-Orthodox Jewish community in Jerusalem, Bati (Nur Fibak) has a seemingly perfect life. She is happily married to Lazer (Uri Blufarb) and the young couple have three children. But their world begins to crumble when Lazer is blackmailed and Bati discovers his secret affair with his male study partner. Desperate to protect her family and keep the man she loves, she supports Lazer as he attempts to "cure" his homosexuality, while realizing her own desires. A complex, beautifully told story about the stark choices non-heterosexuals in the ultra-Orthodox world face. Bergman shows compassion for characters on all sides of the story.
